
CLM and sustainability planning - Challenges and Questions



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
What does sustainability mean for community-led monitoring?



- Well-established CLM programs with adequate infrastructure
- Community ownership of CLM data
- CLM as part of the broader health systems and a top priority for the Government
- Strong collaboration between implementers and government



What does sustainability mean for community-led monitoring?



- Sustained technical support for both nascent and maturing programs
- Intensified CLM data use for advocacy
- Building leadership within communities




What does sustainability mean for community-led monitoring?



- Maintaining CLM as a priority for the HIV response
- Inclusive of all populations (including key and vulnerable populations)
- Scaling up of the CLM program beyond HIV





- In-sufficient Funding; more funding data generation
- CLM Funding mechanism; do we need an intermediary for CLM funds?
- Policies on data access and ownership
- Coordination across CLM programs
